## Dear Readers,

Happy New Year! It's hard to believe that our next season on Mallard Island is just around the corner. I'm already immersed in logistics planning, phoning, emailing and scheduling of both visitors and volunteers for repair work to make sure we can accommodate guests. We have a robust schedule planned. Many weeks were originally scheduled for 2022, but were cancelled due to the flood. We are optimistic that these same planned program weeks will happen this year.



#### Renewal

Although the flood was challenging, it brought renewal to the foundation. Triaging and reassessing our sustainability helped clarify priorities. First, we needed to do some electrical work and rewiring for flood safety; we did not want to have to turn off all power again during a flood. Also, while pulling furniture out of harms way, we realized some mattresses needed replacing. I am happy to report that our electrical system is now flood resilient, and we are going to replace many mattresses with the help of donations and a grant. Also, we have identified a volunteer who will make new curtains for the cabins!

#### **Calling all quilters**

With new mattresses and curtains, we also are looking at new blankets for those chilly nights. Laura Pawlacyk, one of our caretakers, suggested we seek volunteers to sew quilts. Having handmade quilts in our cabins would be a wonderful way of enhancing the look and feel of our living museum. As part of our collections, we have one of Ober's old quilts. So - calling all quilters! You can pick the cabin and the bed you would like to adorn with your quilt on a first-come basis. We will display all donated handmade quilts at our Fall Gathering in late October. Laura is our first volunteer and she is sewing a quilt for the upper room in Front House. Thank you Laura! Please contact me if you are willing and able to partake in this exciting project.

#### **Two Legacy Grants**

I'm excited to announce that we received two small Minnesota Legacy grants with funds provided by the State of Minnesota Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund through the Minnesota Historical Society. The first is for a Collections Storage Plan for our Mallard Island Annex Library at the Backus Community Center, which will house the books from the old flooded Library and provide collections work space. The second grant is for a Conditions Assessment Report on the historic stonework around Mallard Island. Repairing it is an expensive proposition, and this grant will help us assess the condition and develop a plan to tackle the restoration over time.

Finally, thank you to all who lifted the foundation up during the flood by volunteering and making donations and encouraging friends and family to support us. What a team effort! With your continued support, we will be able to continue sharing Ober's legacy and Mallard Island home.

processing with an eye towards keeping the island and the legacy going. I have always had a passion for building and a curiosity for how things are put together and those skills have come together to make me somewhat of a handyman. hand during many construction projects. In recent years, these skills have allowed me to be able to expand by involvement with the foundation into official work projects on the island such as the tool shed rebuild and most recently flood cleanup projects.

When I think about the future of the Oberholtzer Foundation, I am well-aware of the fact that it is important to continue to cultivate the next generation of stewards for this place. I have a strong desire to help make the island accessible to people in the beginning stages of their professional life where time and money are always a commodity in short supply. ## Message From the Chair

It's tough to think of green trees, blue sky, beautiful Rainy Lake, warm summer breezes, fresh pine scent of Mallard summer days at this time of the year. But with visions of the flood in our rear view mirror, your Oberholtzer Foundation is looking forward to hosting a full programming season. The flood provided an opportunity to rewire the eastern end of Mallard so the infrastructure project will enhance our ability to host programming weeks. We're also freshening up Mallard lodging, investing in new mattresses, curtains and blankets.



Last year we completed policy updates and established new ones as part of modernizing our administrative infrastructure. And this is the year we get after our strategic plan, the first with a full-time executive director and the security of an endowment fund. This exceptionally important fund helps us focus more effort on programming supporting our mission, and less on what we need to do to keep the lights on. We are humbly thankful for all the volunteer and financial support our Oberholtzer friends provided in recent years.

We also have changes in our board lineup with two long-time board members Mike Reid and Diane Tessari who are institutions unto themselves, finishing out their terms as board members. But as we know they will likely not go too far as it's tough to really leave when there is still so much more work to be done on committees or as volunteers. We are also welcoming two new board members who are young enough to stay busy for a long time. Teghan Grulkowski and Eric Rundell are enthusiastically ready to go to work. We also welcome Kier Johnson as our new Treasurer. He's already busy pouring over our finances and thinking about what's next for us.

As many already know, we've established a presence in the Backus Community Center where we can begin work organizing the books rescued from the library building, soon to be repurposed. The Backus space will allow us to host events, conduct research and work on archives.

### Letter from the Treasurer



Hello, and nice to meet you! I am the newly elected Treasurer for the Oberholtzer Foundation. I took over from Michael Reid at the first of the year when Michael's term ended. I hope you will join me in offering Michael heartfelt thanks for his years of service to the Ober Board, both as Director and Treasurer.

I joined the Ober Board at the outset of 2022 and I am honored to serve with such a distinguished group to help fulfill the mission of the Foundation; to preserve Ober's island home and promote his legacy. I was born and grew up in International Falls. I have fond memories of Ober visiting my parents' home for dinner parties in the 1960's as well as visits to both his home at Wildcroft and Mallard Island. Two of my

most prized possessions are copies of Moby Dick and Tom Sawyer that Ober gave to a young reader from his personal collection.

As you know, we have come through a difficult time. Investment earnings were severely challenged throughout 2022 at the same time historic flooding forced us to cancel summer programming. We could not have survived without the enormous outpouring of both financial support and "boots on the ground" volunteer labor. We are a small organization, and program fees are deliberately affordable. That means we rely on generous donations for both current operations and to build our endowment. We were immensely gratified to have received record donations in 2022 including a very significant gift to the Endowment.

This will be a year of rebuilding, but we are building on a solid foundation. We still have physical infrastructure needs, including preparing for a significant project to stabilize our historic stonework. At the same time, we are working to expand our outreach efforts to promote Ober's legacy locally and more broadly. Yes, all of those efforts require money, and we will be inviting our loyal friends to continue supporting our annual operations as well as to help us rebuild our endowed funds. We have been very fortunate to receive small grants from the Minnesota Legacy Fund to get us started with outreach and preservation efforts, including a new partnership with the Backus Center in International Falls to create a space for preservation and research with some of Ober's thousands of books from the old Library. (In my spare time, I also Chair the Archives Committee). We all think Ober would have been delighted that the community center named for his old adversary will be hosting parts of his collections!




Thank you also to those of you who supported and attended our Fall Gathering. While the event is for outreach and celebration, your donations and auction participation provided important financial support.
